As I write this note I am saddened by the thought it will soon be time for me to hand back my church keys, the hymn book I have got at home, and collect my robes!

I am of course excited about our forthcoming move to Rainow and taking up the challenge of a new ministry, for which I feel I have been extremely well prepared for by my wonderful curacy here at St Cross. But mixed feelings are not unusual, and especially so at Easter, where we of course undergo the sadness of Good Friday before the joy of Easter Day.

One of the gospel readings for Easter Sunday is Mark 16:1-8 and you will recall that on that first Easter morning, Mary Magdalene and Mary, the mother of James and Salome, brought spices with them to Jesus' tomb, where they found the stone had already been rolled away from the entrance, and upon entering the cave saw a figure in white; unsurprisingly they were alarmed. The young man in white then speaks to them: "Do not be alarmed; you are looking for Jesus of Nazareth, who was crucified. He has been raised; he is not here. Look, there is the place they laid him. But go, tell his disciples and Peter that he is going ahead of you to Galilee; there you will see him, just as he told you." We are then told that the women fled "for terror and amazement had seized them..."



Liz, Grace and I do not intend to disappear into the sunset; rather we intend to keep in touch with the wonderful church family which is St Cross, so rather than say goodbye I will simply wish you all every blessing this Easter.
